ADVISORY OPINION NO. 10-045-E

June 11, 2010

Question Presented: May the employer of a former school board member sell supplies to the school district within one year of the former member leaving office?

Brief Answer: No. Section 109, Miss. Const. of 1890, and its statutory parallel, Section 25-4-105(2), Miss. Code of 1972, prohibit a member of a public board from having any direct or indirect interest in a contract funded or otherwise authorized by that board during his or her term or for one year thereafter.

The Mississippi Ethics Commission issued this opinion on the date shown above in accordance with Section 25-4-17(i), Mississippi Code of 1972, as reflected upon its minutes of even date. The Commission is empowered to interpret and opine only upon Article IV, Section 109, Mississippi Constitution of 1890, and Article 3, Chapter 4, Title 25, Mississippi Code of 1972. This opinion does not interpret or offer protection from liability for any other laws, rules or regulations. The Commission based this opinion solely on the facts and circumstances provided by the requestor as restated herein. The protection from liability provided under Section 25-4-17(i) is limited to the individual who requested this opinion and to the accuracy and completeness of these facts.

I. LAW

The pertinent Ethics in Government Laws to be considered here are as follows:

Section 109, Miss. Const. of 1890.

No public officer or member of the legislature shall be interested, directly or indirectly, in any contract with the state, or any district, county, city, or town thereof, authorized by any law passed or order made by any board of which he may be or may have been a member, during the term for which he shall have been chosen, or within one year after the expiration of such term.

Section 25-4-103, Miss. Code of 1972.

(f) "Contract" means:

(i) Any agreement to which the government is a party; or

(ii) Any agreement on behalf of the government which involves the payment of public funds.

(g) "Government" means the state and all political entities thereof, both collectively and separately, including but not limited to:

(i) Counties;

(ii) Municipalities;

(iii) All school districts;

(iv) All courts; and

(v) Any department, agency, board, commission, institution, instrumentality, or legislative or administrative body of the state, counties or municipalities created by statute, ordinance or executive order including all units that expend public funds.

(o) "Public funds" means money belonging to the government.

(p) "Public servant" means:

(i) Any elected or appointed official of the government;

(ii) Any officer, director, commissioner, supervisor, chief, head, agent or employee of the government or any agency thereof, or of any public entity created by or under the laws of the state of Mississippi or created by an agency or governmental entity thereof, any of which is funded by public funds or which expends, authorizes or recommends the use of public funds;
or

(iii) Any individual who receives a salary, per diem or expenses paid in whole or in part out of funds authorized to be expended by the government.

Section 25-4-105, Miss. Code of 1972.

(2) No public servant shall be interested, directly or indirectly, during the term for which he shall have been chosen, or within one (1) year after the expiration of such term, in any contract with the state, or any district, county, city or town thereof, authorized by any law passed or order made by any board of which he may be or may have been a member.

II. FACTS

Facts provided by the requestor are set forth below, with identifying information redacted, and are considered a part of this opinion.

I served for 20 years as Board Member of the County School Board. My tenure ended December 31, 2009.

Three years ago I retired from one company and went to work for an office supply company in another county. Since I reside in [my home county where the county school district is located], the company asked me to visit our county school district as a sales representative.

At that time I called the Ethics Commission and asked if this would be a problem since I was on the School Board. They advised me not to call on the County Schools as long as I was a Board Member for the district. I complied with their opinion and did not call on the school system.

Now that I am no longer a Board Member, I own no interest in the company, I am not paid commission for my sales because I am a salaried employee, and since I don't take supply orders directly from the customer, I respectfully ask for an opinion as to whether I can proceed to be a Sales Rep. to the County School District.

III. ANALYSIS

Section 109, Miss. Const. of 1890, and its statutory parallel, Section 25-4-105(2), Miss. Code of 1972, both quoted above, prohibit a member of a public board from having any direct or indirect interest in a contract funded or otherwise authorized by that board during his or her term or for one year thereafter. Frazier v. State, ex rel. Pittman, 504 So.2d 675, 693 (Miss. 1987). An employee of a business is presumed to have a prohibited interest in that business's income. Therefore, the former school board member's employer may not sell to the school district until the former member has been off the board for one year - January 1, 2011.
